## **Public Reporting**

The new Title I regulations which became final in November 2008, added new requirements pertaining to public reporting on a district's website. To ensure parents have current information on public school choice and supplemental educational services (SES), a district must prominently display on its website, in a timely manner, specific information including:

- The number of students who were eligible for and the number of students who participated in public school choice and SES, beginning with data from the 2007-2008 school year and each subsequent school year.
- For the current school year, a list of SES providers approved by the state to serve the LEA and the locations where services are provided.
- For the current school year, a list of available schools to which students eligible to participate in public school choice may transfer.

A district must display such information unless it:

- Does not have any qualifying Title I schools,
- Is not able to offer SES because no state-approved providers serve the district,  
or
- Does not maintain a website.

If an LEA does not have its own website, the state must include the information for the LEA on its website.

## Public Website Reporting Requirements – SAMPLE

### ► Public School Choice – 2012-2013 School Year

When a school is identified as not meeting the state established Adequately Yearly Progress (AYP) proficiency percentages for two consecutive years or more, the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires that the school be identified as a program improvement school and that the school offer school choice to parents whose students attend the identified school. This means that, if a parent wishes, he/she may send their child to another school in the district that is currently meeting AYP and transportation costs must be covered by the school district. Priority is given to the lowest achieving children from low-income families. Public school choice is the option for a student to attend another public school district within the district that is outside the student's school attendance area.

### ► Supplemental Educational Services – 2012-2013 School Year

Supplemental educational services (SES) are additional instruction programs designed to increase the academic achievement of students in schools that have not met Adequately Yearly Progress (AYP) for three or more years. These services include help in academic subjects such as reading, language arts, and mathematics, provided free-of-charge to eligible students. These services are provided outside of the regular school day – before or after school, on weekends, or in the summer. They may be offered through public or private sector providers that are approved by the state, such as public schools, public charter schools, local education agencies, educational service agencies, and faith-based organizations.

States must maintain a list of approved providers from which parents may select. The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction has posted the list of approved providers on its website at [www.dpi.state.nd.us/title1/targeted/general/ses/ses\\_provider.shtm](http://www.dpi.state.nd.us/title1/targeted/general/ses/ses_provider.shtm).
